Westwood Hills Nature Center is a 150-acre natural area featuring marsh, woods and restored prairie. The preserve is beautiful throughout the seasons and provides homes for many animals including deer, fox, mink and owls. Westwood naturalists conduct year-round programs to increase visitors' understanding and appreciation of our natural world. The nature center is located just south of I-394 and east of Highway 169. Parking and admission are free. Wood-chipped and hard-surface accessible trails are open from dawn to dusk year-round.

Beginners' Nature Photography



Get Involved, Volunteer in St. Louis Park!

Spring into action and become a volunteer! Volunteering is a great way to learn new skills, meet people, gain job or school credit or add variety to your routine. You can make St. Louis Park a better place to live. To volunteer for these or other programs, contact Sarah at the City and School Volunteer Office at (952) 928-6025 or email krzesowiak.sarah@slpschools.org.

Adopt a Park and/or Garden

Volunteer to monitor your neighborhood park. Parks still in need of adoption include: Ainsworth, Bass Lake Preserve, Birchwood, Blackstone, Cedarhurst, Dakota, Ford Road, Hampshire, Keystone, Knollwood Green, Rainbow, Roxbury, Twin Lakes, and Webster. Garden volunteers are needed at Wolfe and Aquila Parks along with several other locations around the city.

Adopt a Park/Garden volunteers can choose to maintain the annual garden and/or patrol their park each week during the summer, keep litter picked up and the park looking tidy, and report any vandalism or needed repairs. Park volunteers report to the Environmental Coordinator. Volunteers may adopt the park/garden of their choice (providing it has not already been adopted). Time commitment is about one hour per week during the summer.

One Time Helpers Needed to Plant Flower Gardens in City Parks

Volunteers are needed in mid-May to help plant gardens around the city. If you have 2-3 hours and enjoy working with flowers, this is a great way to help beautify our city.
